

News from the 3905 CCN Handi Ham Bureau



My path to Top Band DXCC

Top Band DXCC, Finally!

I have taken breaks from the Century Club nets for the past three 160-m seasons to try for a DXCC on that band. I got the final contacts needed in March 2017 and received the 100th LotW confirmation on April 1 (no fooling) and ended up with 103 confirmations for ARRL DXCC certificate #2974 on April 21, 2017.

A Top Band DXCC is quite a challenge, requiring a lot of late hours and some very early hours listening for a chance to work a new one. Of course, you can catch a break with the grey line propagation and get some tough ones like **Saudi Arabia, Australia and Japan**. Those openings can sometimes be only 5-10 minutes, so you have to have cheeks in the seat to have a chance. Other times (late, late) you have to listen, listen, listen until you finally have enough copy to try to work them. It's frustrating to only copy parts while you wait, and sometimes you have to try again on another night.

The antenna I used to get all the contacts was an inverted L that is vertical for 55 feet and runs 75 feet horizontal at the top, with 14 radials that are 130 feet long. I did not have a listening antenna or array, which would have helped a lot since many DX stations on that band do, so they can hear you but I couldn't hear them when I wished. I also had to get an amp, since I had topped out at 29 confirmed back in 2014. Until then I was a 100 watt station and you can do a lot with that and a good antenna... although a better antenna is always my goal.

I wasn't sure about finishing the DXCC this season, as I had gotten to about 90 and it was late in the season. In February and March of this year I picked up the remainder, many of which were a surprise. I was really pleased to work **Australia, Japan, Saudi Arabia, Western Sahara, Cyprus, Kaliningrad, Pitcairn Island** and a few other needed ones in Europe. I'm glad that goal is achieved and I now have **9** - band DXCC.

Now, back to the nets and chasing the **40**th **Anniversary Award**!

Jeterans of Foreign Wars



Soldiers of Eternity

ast year on Memorial Day, I marched the Veterans down Main Street in Naples, calling cadence as loud as I could amidst the hearty shouts of thankful

citizens. The cheers were so loud I could not hear myself, and it was a wonder that the Veterans heard me; keeping in step to honor the fallen.

In an instant, a thought flashed in my mind that I determined to communicate after the parade that the day was not about me. I kept marching on through the cheers, thankful, yes, that I was serving our small town, but in despair that many did not understand the importance of the day; cheering for the wrong reasons. Afterward, I had many come up to me and thank me for my service, to which I said immediately "thank you" and added: "but the day isn't about me, it's about the soldiers that never made it home." Some understood, some didn't; many like me obliged to do the same thing for thankful citizens on Memorial Day because it is part of our duty to educate, as it is to preserve the memory of fallen heroes.

Memorial Day is not to honor the living. Rather, the day is about warriors who have met God, those who guard the gates of Heaven; whom God predestined to die for America - for every Citizen in wars that span from glorious revolution in 1776 to the mountains of Afghanistan in 2017. Yes, war is a distant thing today. Civilians have not seen the carnage with their own eyes, we have not seen what the dead have seen in destiny thanks to His provision. Our wars are kept on shores distant, and praise God thanks to many sacrifices they are far away from our loved ones' reach. Soldiers die, thousands of miles away, standing their post - the greatest act of love for God and Country This is the day the entire nation recognizes them, whereas the Veteran remembers

them daily; the memory fresh as it was yesterday. Reflecting upon the sacrifice of millions, to my departed brothers I say: I will be faithful.

Veterans exist for one reason: to honor our fallen brothers. We stand, colors in view on the day of remembrance amidst flags waving, firing rifles, and our cannons are heard miles around. For one sacred day we recognize we are less of a nation in the absence of a few gallant Veterans who gave the ultimate sacrifice. They are America's finest - close to us especially on Memorial Day. If you would approach us and gently ask of them, you will know the face of one who holds truths seldom revealed, and that man or woman he served with locked up in a treasure of memory regarded as a symbol of American greatness. Yes, we knew them. Yes, our brothers are real, and they really fought for us in wars mostly forgotten. And, though they are at rest now, away from the troubles of this world, we cannot forget, we cannot consecrate their memory more than allowing you, dear citizen, to access our thoughts even just for a day, to inquire, "Who was that man? What was he like? That you, American, might be increased by the remembrance.

The Veteran has come to be known as the authority of Memorial Day, yet it is not about him, the living remnant of past wars, not about the bullets or the bombs, not about the politics or divided national sentiment of any war, but freedom provided at a dear cost. Freedom. Can any one of us truly say that they know a life without freedom? I can't, and I have been in the sands of Iraq fighting as if I were slave to the fighting, yet I was free the whole while. Free to fight as my departed brothers were free to fight. We made a pact with our country, an oath, to die in her arms when she saw fit under the blessing of God. And under God's blessing, I write today; owing to Him only that I am alive to speak at all.

On this day, my family and I have a tradition. We gather leis of flowers and travel to the graveyards. I tell my children: "these flowers are for the soldiers." We walk from grave to grave marked with flags and place flowers on them in remembrance of the sacrifice made by those soldiers killed in one of our many wars. When is the last time you have walked one of our graveyards? The price of your freedoms is clearly to be seen there. The flags are alone in the breeze, some need to be up-righted, and some of the graves are unkempt. What will you do, dear citizen, to set it right? I find flags that are on their side and plant them firmly in the ground while my daughters adorn the graves in honor. Yes, this nation and its ideals are bigger than you. Will you show for a moment that you recognize it and right the flags, and place the flowers? It is only for a moment, a day, that the dead soldier requires your attention, why not give it to him, even for just a moment? Yes, America needs you, dear citizen, on this day and every day to remember its fallen soldiers.

So I leave you with this, dear citizen: Praise your God and love your country. Talk to the Veterans and learn from them. Visit the graves, lay the flowers, and remember the men and women who gave the ultimate sacrifice. May God in his infinite mercy bless your souls. Send up a prayer tonight, do not let the day rest until you've remembered the fallen.

An epigraph from 1942 states: Went the day well? We died and never knew, But, well or ill, Freedom, we died for you.

From the QSL Bureau ...

As I sit here at work sorting inbound mail for the week I have a few points to send out to the huddled masses...

1) It appears that the postal sort line at Columbus had at least 1 machine in the last couple weeks that decided it was going to snack on QSL Buro Envelopes. Thanks to those who politely let us know there was a problem. When it is 1 or 2 in a mailing we wonder if we boogered something up. But when we now know of at least 7 people effected, that one is beyond our control.

2) A couple of you have pointed out that the above could be avoided by use of more packing tape. A couple of them possibly, but a couple of them were completely mangled and one (a 3 ounce envelope) had the corner cut off, including the corner of the cards at that end of the envelope. No amount of tape is going to help those. I try to use enough tape to ensure intact delivery, and will be increasing what I use based on our latest issues from the sort line.

3) A couple people apparently expect absolute perfection, that is just not possible. We process on average over 150 pcs of mail weekly inbound. If these were only 1 ounce (figuring an average of 7 cards to an ounce) that is 1050 cards/week. Now, add the fact we get multiple 2 and 3 ounce envelopes weekly and at least 2 or 3 times a month a bulk pack from someone with several hundred in it. If we miss a card for someone else now and then, we apologize, but it is going to happen. Occasionally 2 operators stacks get put together by accident, or a card gets dropped in the wrong hanging file, or a couple cards stick together. It happens! Please don't send scathing messages if we botch up one or two here or there. If we send you an entire envelope of someone else's cards, let us know...politely. We strive to keep the errors to a minimum, but we are after all human.

4) Again I ask you to NOT staple or tape cards together or staple or tape notes to them. If I can't look at a callsign and see a 7 in it and know it goes in the pile for the 7th Call Area or a non-US call and know it is DX, I probably shouldn't be a ham much less running a QSL Buro. Trust me we know these things. Likewise we know who is QSL manager for who, we kinda gotta know this to mail stuff to the right people. These little notes just add weight to your outbound mail (and increase your postage) and add time for us when we rip that stuff off, especially when it is covering the callsign of the station it is going to.

5) When sorting your cards coming to us, please sort the by call area starting with 1s ending with 0s. This is done by the number in the callsign **REGARDLESS** of where the person lives. Just because NC8I lives in FL does not mean he is filed with the 4s. It is still an 8 and his file is in the drawer with the 8s. If you want to lump DX in with 5s and Handihams in with 2s that is

cool. DX goes to WB5FDP so we toss them in his folder (in the 5s) and Handihams go to KC2IYE so we toss them in his folder (in the 2s).

6) It has been asked before and I am asking again, **PLEASE DO NOT** use plain paper or photo paper. Plain paper is considerably more difficult to sort than card stock. Also as I pointed out before, photo paper, with the slightest amount of moisture, not just sticks together, but almost glues itself together. It either adds time to sorting trying to get them apart or ruins the cards when they can't be separated.

7) For the love of god use the GIB Look Up! I am sure the folks at Wal-Mart appreciate my very regular purchase of orange post-it notes, but when we have to send someone a 3 ounce envelope of just cards that are not GIB, there is a problem. The data is out there for anyone to see, please use it.

8) The last one is please write legibly. Yes I work in healthcare, but I never claimed to be able to ready the writing of the doctors and it is easier than some of the QSL cards lately. If I can't read it, I can't send it and if I can't read it the area award managers or ARRL Card Checkers probably can't either.

There are other little issues on an individual basis, but these are the biggies and are frequent enough from enough people the mass email was needed. And in closing, anyone who gets butt hurt over this email I would invite you to travel to Dayton, OH and take a day to process the inbound mail and see just why the level of aggravation is high enough to send this email.

Please remember that the normal accepted standard size of a QSL card is 3.5" by 5.5". I am seeing more and more that are considerable above that in one dimension or the other, and a few that are above that in both dimensions. This creates multiple issues on multiple facets. For those who are copying cards to send to awards managers it hoses up the whole getting 4 cards to a page without some sort of reduction which can hamper the ability to read the needed information. Face it, none of us are getting any younger. For the filing of cards by recipients, they won't fit in some filing systems due to the size. Last, here at the buro it creates 2 potential issues. For those who insist on sending small SASEs they simply won't fit without having to fold them in half and limiting further how many cards we can send in an envelope. Also if we are sending a 3 ounce envelope they will not fit in one of the 2 stacks within the divider inside. Also some of them we are seeing are even too big to fit in a number 10 without folding.


I know it sounds like I am bitching, but it really does hose up things on far more levels than many even consider.

How's DX

9Q, DEM. REP. OF THE CONGO: Fernando, EA4BB (ex-9Q5BB, D2BB, ST2BF, TU5JL, TZ6BB, Z21BB), is now active as 9Q6BB from Kinshasa (eastern part of the country) for up to the next 3 years. Activity has been on 20/17 meters using CW. Operations are QRP using an Elecraft KX2 w/5w into a Vertical telescopic whip 5.2m antenna. QSL via W3HNK.

DA - FEDERAL REPUBLIC OF GERMANY: Special event station DM150HSM celebrates the 150th anniversary of the University of Applied Sciences at Mittweida and is active until the end of June. Activity is on the HF bands using mostly SSB, and some CW and PSK. QSL via KOMIT.

DL, Germany: Operators of the club station DLOVBG from the railway museum Vienenburg (DOK H09) will be working with the special event call DR0HARZ (special DOK 25HSB) during 2017 to mark the 25th anniversary of the return of the narrow gauge Brocken Railway (1141m asl). QSL via DF7AA (d/B).

DL, Germany: DM200LFS (special DOK 200LFS) commemorates the 200th birthday of Louis Ferdinand Schoenherr, a German inventor of power looms. The special event station will be on the air until the end of February 2018. All QSOs count as a "joker" and 10 points for the KIDS award, supporting SOS Children's Villages in Saxony. J2, Djibouti: Dane/S53T will be staying in Djibouti until the end of 2019 and has now received his operating permit with the call J28ND. Right now he works with a low power rig and vertical antennas. QSL via S57DX.

JA, Japan: 8J1IP draws attention to the 100th anniversary of the Inokashira Park. QRV until June 30, QSL via bureau. The Katayanagi Institute of the University of Tokyo celebrates its 70th anniversary on the air with the call 8J1YAC until the end of March 2018. QRV on 160m-70cm on CW and SSB. QSL via bureau, JE1XUZ (d).

LZ, Bulgaria: Nasko/LZ1YE celebrates his 45th year on the air with the call LZ45YE throughout the year. QRV on HF on SSB, CW, and digital modes. QSL via LZ1YE (d/B). The Headquarter of the Thracian Rose Club operates with the call LZ73TRC during 2017. QSL via LZ1YE (d/B). Members of the Thracian Rose Club are going to direct our attention to the 114th Roses Festival with the call LZ114RF until July 31. QSL via LZ1YE (d/B). http://www.trcdx.org/

OH, Finland: Finnish hams will be using the prefix OF during 2017 to celebrate their country's 100 years of independence.

OM, SLOVAK REPUBLIC: Special event station OM42KYSUCE is QRV until the end of June 2017 during the context of the 42nd ARDF Kysuca Cup that will be held on June 16 to 18. QSL via OM3CND.

S5, Slovenia: S5100LIONS celebrates the 100th anniversary of the Lions Club International until the end of 2017. QSL via S53DOX.

YV, Venezuela: The Asociacion de Radioaficionados de Venezuela (ARV) celebrates its 50th anniversary with the special call YV50ARV until the year's end on HF (CW, SSB, digital modes). QSL via YV5DTA/W4DTA, LoITW.

AF-005–D4, Cape Verde: Harald/DF2WO plans to operate from Santiago Island (AF-005) between May 3 and June 8 on 80-6m, signing D44TWO. QSL via MOOXO.
